



MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

In life we meet different kinds of storms: conflicts, criticisms, fears, misfortunes, medical obstacles. Even as a church we encounter storms: oppositions, hurts, financial difficulties, scandals and many others. Recently we

encounter the sad experience of break in and attempted fire that threatens and hurts. In our personal life and in our life as a church, there can be squalls, sudden onsets of strong winds, storms that catch us off guard. It can naturally shock us and make us afraid, like the disciples in the gospel story this week.

In the first reading, Job is challenged to look at God who is the creator and has complete control over all the aspects of the world. There are factors beyond man's control and comprehension. God and God alone is capable to taming the sea of life. There is something about the reality of nature and life that can be a threat to humanity and control of these forces in clearly within divine intervention.

We hear from the story the contrast between Jesus, tranquil and comfortably asleep and the disciples, troubled and afraid. The sleeping Christ gives us the message of peace amidst the storm. The invitation of inner serenity, a disposition of trust in God as Job did. It is peace and we are called to access that space of peace in God. Have you ever tried spending time in the blessed sacrament and experience that tranquility knowing that you are so close to the ever present God in the blessed sacrament? That is our safe and peaceful space. It does not mean that storms go away, rather being with God we find the inner peace that make us endure the storm.

What makes us afraid? Metaphorically, because we allow the Christ to sleep in us. Christ is in us. But we allow worldliness to creep in us we forget about Christ in us. We get busy and spend our all our time in worldly matters. We allow it (the spirit if Christ in us) to "sleep". How is our prayer life? Do we read any spiritual book? Have we engaged our selves in Christ to know him? Do we have an active and dynamic relationship with Christ or have we kept it "dormant"?

The message we hear this week indeed is a loud cry to care for our spiritual health. It is never too late. Jesus is in us, we only have to rediscover him in us!

Parish Statement Regarding Fire Father Victor Valencia, Pastor

It's been two weeks since the unfortunate incident of break in and fire early morning of Sunday, June 9th. First and foremost, we are grateful that the building was empty and no one was hurt. We are grateful Sunday Masses in the main church on the first floor are unaffected and nearly all parish activities continue. We are also grateful that our sprinkler system activated when fire and smoke were detected, that the security system dispatched fire and police, and that combination helped to contain the fire to an electric piano, carpet and a flag.

We are grateful for our insurance company assisting us in the necessary repairs in the affected areas. The damage is extensive.

While we are frustrated and saddened about the damage, we are more concerned that a person – a brother or sister in Christ – would target a church where we try and live Christ's love for all inside our building and in our community by reaching out to those on the margins. We will continue to pray for the person/s who committed this crime and minister to the faithful and to those with whom God generously places in our path.

Now we move on and work on clean up and restoration. We welcome new possibilities. In this process of restoration we are given the opportunity to upgrade our facility and reflect on making the space more efficient and welcoming. We will also be upgrading and make new plans regarding safety and security.

Your pastor together with the pastoral council are working to redefine and redesign the space considering the thoughts and suggestions of a number of active and concerned parish members.

Let us continue to pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Let us also pray that many hearts and hands be extended to our parish especially in the work of redesign and financial support.

Learning from the gospel message this week, this is one storm in our journey that we can surpass because God is with us.

SCRIP- how to reload


Instructions for how to set up SCRIP so you can both purch or reload your cards at home.



- Type in *Raise Right* on your web browser
- Click on Join an existing program
- Enter enrollment code B89AB59714377
- Click on enroll button
- Type in your first and last name only and click next
- Add your email and create a password
- Pick your 2 security questions and fill in your answers
- Set up your recovery phone (your mobile phone) and click what method you prefer-text or phone call and then you will receive a 6 digit code you will enter
- Click on get started
