

MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR



Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Every year, on the final Sunday of Lent we remember the joyful and royal entry of Jesus to Jerusalem at the same time we read the passion narrative of our Lord Jesus Christ. We recall his last seven days on earth beginning with this story.

Significantly we will notice that at the beginning of his final week, his entrance of Jerusalem speaks of the reality of Jesus that he is the messiah. His welcome to Jerusalem befits a king's entry, much more as the messiah. The passion narrative also tells us the kind of Messiah he is.

The first reading (Is 50:4-7) is a description of the famous Suffering Servant, who gives his back to those who smite it, who gives his cheeks to those who pull out his beard, and who doesn't hide his face from shame and from spitting. We identify this servant as Jesus himself. He is this king who is going to mysteriously reign and inaugurate the new exodus (in the book of Isaiah), and the good news of salvation precisely through his suffering, through his passion, through his death; so he's the servant who both suffers and dies. "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" It's the cry of the suffering servant who even though he is a king, even though he's Messiah, the anointed one, he undergoes suffering and rejection as well as having his hands and his feet pierced.

We now enter into this final week, the foundational mysteries of what it means to be a believer of Jesus Christ. Our liturgies are at one point traditional and at the same time relevant. We are at the height of our mystery of salvation. This is an important week for us. Come let us celebrate!!


There many events in the passion of Jesus that invites reflection. Take note of the betrayal of Judas Iscariot and the denial of Peter. What does the agony of the garden mean for us? What can we make out of the humiliation at the courtyard, the crowning of thorns and the carrying of the cross? These are some of the many events of the passion that we should take notice and reflect upon.

May we all have a prayerful holy week.
